Part 1

Littering

§6-101. Short Title.

This Part shall be known and may be cited as the "West Cocalico Township Anti-Littering Ordinance."

§6-102. Littering.

No person, firm, corporation or association shall throw, or drop, or cause to be thrown or dropped upon any street or other public place or upon the land of another, any garbage, bottles, waste paper, cans, wood cartons, ashes, metal or metal sweepings, wire, glass, handbills, cardboard, boxes of any kind, nails, discarded or soiled personal property, trash or rubbish of any kind, nor interfere with, scatter or disturb the contents of any receptacle containing garbage, ashes, household wastes or rubbish which has been placed upon any sidewalk or elsewhere for the collection of the contents thereof.

§6-103. Sweeping Litter Into Gutters Prohibited.

No person shall sweep into or deposit in any gutter, street or other public place within the Township the accumulation of litter from any building or lot or from any public or private sidewalk or driveway. Persons owning or occupying property shall keep the sidewalk in front of their premises free from litter. Persons owning or occupying places of business within the Township shall keep the sidewalk in front of their business free from litter.

§6-104. Violations.

Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any provision of this Part, upon conviction thereof in an action brought before a magisterial district judge in the manner provided for the enforcement of summary offenses under the Pennsylvania Rules of Criminal Procedure, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of not more than \$1,000 plus costs and, in default of payment of said fine and costs, to a term of imprisonment not to exceed 90 days. Each day that a violation of this Part continues or each Section of this Part which shall be found to have been violated shall constitute a separate offense.
